## Family Spotlight: The James Family



Megan's been through a lot in her young life; sometimes those experiences make her feel older than her 22 years. Growing up, Megan never lived in a house. It was always a trailer or an apartment, and her family moved a lot. She went to multiple schools and never really felt settled. In her senior year of high school, she found out she was pregnant. With only a couple of months until graduation, Megan withdrew from school because she was unable to obtain childcare so that she could attend classes. She immediately took her GED and passed it, but missing graduation is a memory that still makes her emotional

when she talks about it.

The bright spot in her life was the beautiful baby boy that she'd birthed. Unfortunately, the joy that he brought was overshadowed by the lifestyle of her son's father, Jake (not his real name). Jake was several years older than Megan, and his life had become consumed by drugs and alcohol. During their son's first year of life, he and Megan moved 7 times. They would stay in one place until Jake had spent all their money on drugs. Then the next time the rent was due, they would move somewhere else. Before long, Megan had had enough, and the couple separated. She went to live with a friend; he eventually went to rehab.

After 6 months in rehab, Jake graduated from the program and got back together with Megan. She soon learned she was pregnant again. She truly thought that the worst was over and looked forward with anticipation to the birth of another baby. During her first trimester, Jake's sister moved in with them. She was a crack addict who soon lured Jake back into the world of drugs. One night when Megan was 7 months pregnant, Jake showed up demanding money, the money she'd set aside for the rent and the light bill. Knowing he wanted to spend it on drugs, she refused to give it to him. He proceeded to choke her and hit her in the face, while his sister and her boyfriend looked on, but made no effort to intervene. Her son stood by helplessly, screaming and afraid. He was 22 months old.

That night, Megan knew that it was truly over between her and Jake. She packed her bags and moved in with relatives. It was difficult for them to accommodate an expectant mom and a child, so she would spend a week with one family member and then move in with another relative. In February of that year, Megan gave birth to a baby girl. When her daughter was a week old, she was finally able to get her own apartment. She was thrilled to finally have some semblance of normalcy and stability in her life.

In the summer of 2009, another single mother visited the daycare where Megan worked. She was posting flyers about Habitat's application class. Megan was unfamiliar with Habitat and asked all kinds of questions. "Are you in the program?" "What do you have to do?" The other mother explained that she, too, was a working woman with two children, and that the program was doable and well worth the effort. Megan wasn't overly hopeful, but decided to attend the class anyway. She took the application home, filled it out and returned it to the office. Then she sat back to wait.

When Megan got the call that she had been approved, she cried in joy and disbelief. She said later, "I didn't believe I could do it, but I did!" She encourages others by saying, "If you work toward a goal, you can achieve it" Never doubt that Megan has worked tirelessly toward her goal. She's spent hours on construction sites, as well as sweating away at events like the "Rollin' on the River" Car Show and Riverfest in the service of Habitat. She's labored in the winter cold, the summer heat, and under the light of the moon. She's learned how to build, paint, rehab, even repair a toilet. When asked what else she's learned, she replied with a chuckle, "I've learned not to eat pizza on a 98-degree workday!" (That was a lesson learned the hard way, let me tell you...)

Megan's really looking forward to moving into a "fresh" home where she won't hear neighbors on one side screaming during a football game, or a neighbor on the other side yelling at her husband. Her grandmother has promised to plant all sorts of wonderful things in the yard. She's excited about the prospect of being "in one place that's mine, for the rest of my life." She adds, "No matter what happens, we'll have a place to live, and my kids will live in ONE place."

Life is truly about to settle down for Megan James. She hopes that by this time next year, she'll be able to sit in a rocker on her own front porch, soak in the quiet, lean back and say, "HOME...at last!"

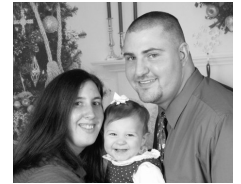

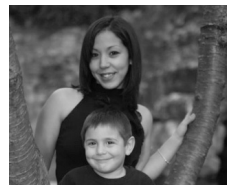

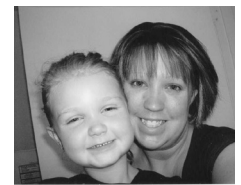
